### A New (Almost normal?) Academic Year



Pictured is the group of 23 students being supported by AGLMUK that attend Wakiso Town Primary School. They started the 2023 academic year one week late - because of Ebola restrictions (see page 2). We very much hope that this will be the only disruption to their education after several years of lost learning. Four students passed their final primary exams and moved on to secondary education and so there are now 24 students attending high school.

Four students passed their A' level exams and are awaiting their next steps — whilst there are quite a few others in university or following vocational options, both in and outside of colleges.

## Coffee Morning (instead of Open Evening)

The Autumn newsletter suggested that there would be an open evening after the trustees returned from the trip to Uganda – and had lots to tell and photographs to show! As you will see overleaf, the trustees didn't make it to Wakiso and so it has been decided that a fundraising coffee morning might be a better option this year with a reversion to the "normal" open evening next year. The venue will be the **St Francis Centre at Holy Trinity Church**, Llandrindod. The date is **Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> April** and it will run from **10.00 – 12.00 noon**.

#### Postponed Trip by AGLMUK Trustees to Uganda

The Autumn newsletter suggested that trustees were likely to be visiting Wakiso in late January of this year and indeed they were on the verge of booking flights when the news broke that a new strain of Ebola had broken out of a very restricted area of rural Uganda and found its way into Kampala. Some deaths had been reported and the Ugandan Government brought in new restrictions. In the face of this news, the trustees decided that it would be rash to go ahead with the trip. As it turns out, the outbreak was brought under control and, with the benefit of hindsight it would have been fine to go. It will probably not be until January/February in 2024 that the trustees will visit. As was planned for this year, however, it will be "business trip".



As a student moves from primary to secondary and then on to vocational or other forms of further education, the cost increases.
