# Food

Thanks to the generous support of many of you we have been able to commit to providing monthly donations throughout the whole of 2016. We only supply a very basic diet of poshu (made from maize flour) and beans. Whilst we are conscious that this is a very restricted diet, the recipients are very grateful that they have guaranteed meals every day. This is often a big improvement over their former situations. We are now saving for 2017!

# **Medicines and Clinic Costs**

The clinic medicine shelves were restocked on our recent visit to Bulabakulu - and money will be transferred every quarter to ensure that there will always be a supply of the basic medicines. There is an arrangement with a local clinic that means that they just have to check with Barry, the Project Coordinator before treating one of the Bulabakulu residents. AGLMUK are informed of the cost and the bill is paid. For first time in our eleven year history of visiting the village, our party experienced the services at St Joseph's Clinic, Wakiso - not just

once but 3 times! We were very grateful indeed for the attention given to Tom and Sarah and the fact that they returned home safely.



## **Primary Education**

Primary education was where it all started for AGLMUK but we have certainly moved on a long way since 2005 when we were helping to build the school.

Wakiso Children'sSchool of Hope is now partially self-sustaining by taking in students from outside of the Bulabakulu village. Whilst these children usually do not pay the full fee, they do provide some income.

Some of the village children are now sponsored by a lovely group of people from Bradford. They were recruited by a group of young people from Sunbridge Road Mission that visited last year.

AGLMUK still provides part of the salaries for the teachers and this happens via a monthly transfer of funds.



Our visiting party in January/February assisted the deputy headteacher and a team of young Bulabakulu residents to re -paint the school. Thanks to those of you that contributed towards the paint.



It might seem obvious now, but back in 2005 we never gave a thought to the fact that primary school children will usually want to become high school students and some of them will go onto higher education and even end up as qualified teachers. Well, little Joshua (left) has become grown-up with wife and child. Joshua now teaches in the school he once attended. He is so incredibly grateful to his long-time sponsors that have committed to supporting him through to degree level by part-time study. Well-done Joshua!



### Secondary Education

It is one of the toughest jobs of the annual visit of trustees to agree with AGLM representatives which of the students that have completed primary school education should be supported through secondary education. The decision depends on the number of sponsors available as well as primary examination results and family backgrounds. Thank you to all the sponsors!

Like Harryson before him, Christopher has used his time since completing his A'levels, to the advantage of the community at Bulabakulu. He has shown aptitude for hard work and community spirit. He is also academically strong—which is, of course, an essential criteria.

# **Vocational Training**

## **Building and Maintenance**



AGLMUK provides the Project Coordinator with funds for emergency maintenance but we also assess the situation on our visit and get some of the highest priority tasks completed. Kevin is here working on the construction of a short wall that will protect the foundations of a dormitory from the heavy rains. Kevin is one of Bulabakulu residents and worked as a labourer for an external builder. He was glad to be paid the going rate for a whole day's work as a labourer - equivalent to £2. The cost of living in Uganda is lower than Wales but not so low as to make £2 stretch a very long way!

# The 2016 Trip

We referred (page 1) to the fact that we had three visits to the clinic in Wakiso with team members this year. This has tended to dominate conversation since we returned. It is, however, very important to say that in many ways, this was a very useful trip. We had good discussions with our Ugandan partners and feel that progress was made in several areas.

It was somewhat frustrating that the government decided to postpone the start of school by three weeks (because of potential civil unrest in the run-up to the presidential elections). This meant that we didn't see many of the primary school children. It did, however, give us the opportunity assist with the painting of the school whilst it was unoccupied.

Chris managed to talk with all of the high school students as they came to see her!

The incidents of serious illness and theft of passports on the last two teams have prompted the trustees to review the taking of other people on trips to Uganda.
