# AGLMUK Trustees at the Next Gathering?

It was March 2020 when the trustees last visited Uganda. It wasn't planned that way, of course, but it turns out that this was just about the last few weeks that were possible prior to lock-downs and travel embargoes. The time now seems right to plan another visit to Wakiso and it is very much hoped that this can coincide with the next "gathering" of the AGLMUK students in late January 2023. With the programme as it now is, with no "village" to visit and maintain, the trustees have decided that this will be very much a "business" trip.

## How is the "Wind-down" Going?

As was explained in the Spring newsletter, the intention now is to try to finish what (or perhaps who) we've started. This means that the youngest person on the AGLMUK programme will be progressively older and far fewer children will be taken into the programme than exit it to independence.

At the moment there are 91 young people in the AGLMUK programme, 28 of whom are in primary school. By the end of next year it is anticipated that the number in primary education will have dropped to 23 and the total in the programme reduced to around 80. The total will not have dropped because people have been abandoned or "thrown out" but because they have reached the point of independence (hence the uncertainty in the figure given).

This does not mean, unfortunately, that the costs will reduce proportionally. Primary school fees have approximately doubled over the last year – see later report on the cost of living etc.

## Huge Increases in Costs



We are all aware that the cost of living has risen very quickly in the UK through a combination of factors. Although Uganda doesn't use much natural gas (methane) for heating, it has been impacted by the world oil prices. Food prices have suffered a double blow from drought in the Horn of Africa (see last newsletter) and the war in Ukraine. Food represents a hugely high proportion of the expenditure of the average Ugandan family – or even boarding school! WaToPS closed two weeks early last term because there was simply no money left with which to buy food for the children! Food prices have rocketted over recent months and these increases are on top of already high prices. Because the cost of food has risen so much, so, inevitably has wage inflation. So the two biggest costs for a boarding school, teacher salaries and food, have soared – and it was thus inevitable that the school fees would jump too. The impact on AGLMUK is worrying, particularly when our supporters are also being hit with higher costs themselves, but the impact on many Ugandan

families is as stark as the withdrawal of children from school.

In our case the rising costs in Uganda have to be coupled with the drop in value of the pound – your Pounds do not buy as many Ugandan Shillings as they did a few weeks or months ago. Some supporters have asked for the up-to-date costs of primary and secondary education. This will be assessed at the end of the first full year back (after the Covid shut-down) and we'll communicate the figures.
